OSHA's General Duty Clause requires that each employer furnish to each of its employees a workplace that is "free from recognized hazards that are causing or likely to cause death or serious physical harm." While this requirement may seem straightforward, OSHA's interpretation and enforcement of this mandate can often be confounding and catch employers off guard, particularly following a workplace accident. This session will explore the latest enforcement trends and strategies for avoiding and defending against citations issued under the General Duty Clause, and discuss recent decisions by the Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission addressing heat stress and workplace violence.

OSHA ENFORCEMENT THROUGH THE LENS OF THE OPPOSITION

There are two sides to every case. While hard to see at times, the government has its own motivations and its own stakeholders to satisfy. Unless we can see our case through OSHA's eyes and the eyes of its lawyers, prevailing will be difficult. On the other hand, knowing how OSHA and the Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission think can be invaluable in strategizing for settlement or trial.
