It's been twelve years since the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) first issued an advanced notice of proposed rulemaking on website accessibility for private businesses under Title III of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), and five years since those regulations were abandoned. Meanwhile, traditional public accommodations and businesses of all kinds have faced an ever-increasing number of lawsuits, often from a growing list of plaintiffs' lawyers attracted to these claims.
